CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

BLUE DAWN

The NSWRL ushered in a new era of success in 2018, with the organisation having plenty of reasons to celebrate both on and off the field.

New Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach Brad Fittler used 13 new players over the course of the State of Origin series. Fittler played a role in helping the team re-engage with fans in Sydney and the players were involved in several important community initiatives.

The new breed of Baby Blues fought hard throughout the series and I was pleased to see them wrap things up after Game Two in front of our home crowd in Sydney. Fittler unearthed several stars over the course of the three games, including Nathan Cleary, Damien Cook, Tom Trbojevic and Latrell Mitchell.

The Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues also welcomed new corporate partners in 2018 and their dedication and support went a long way in helping us achieve our goals. Leading law firm Brydens Lawyers entered into the first of a three-year deal as our official naming rights sponsor to guarantee a period of commercial stability for the team.

Tooheys, of brewery giant Lion, returned as our shorts sponsor to renew an association with the state that first started in 1991 and lasted for 13 years. Canterbury also signed on as our apparel sponsor and they helped shape a fresh, new-look for the jersey using cutting-edge technology while still incorporating the chevron that is synonymous with Rugby League. The Star and nib also renewed their associations to ensure the iconic sky blue jersey remains one of the more lucrative brands in Australia.

It was also extremely satisfying to see our women's team win the inaugural State of Origin match against Queensland with the match decided in the final 10 minutes. The Harvey Norman NSW Women's team has dominated Queensland for the past three years and they showed remarkable resolve to triumph in what was an extremely close and entertaining match.

The NSWRL is also making strong inroads at grassroots level across the state with Rugby League recording an increase in participation levels for the first time in five years. There are now more than 100,000 participants across the state and almost 42,000 in the Sydney metropolitan area alone. The increase in female participation has been particularly impressive with a 60 per cent increase being recorded on participation numbers from the 2017 season.

This season also saw a landmark agreement between the NSWRL and the Country Rugby League (CRL) to come together under the one banner in 2020. Both parties have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding which would see Rugby League in NSW governed by one body for the first time in 80 years. The single entity is aiming to come into operation on 1 November 2020 and will allow for significantly more combined resources to deliver Rugby League programs and competitions across the whole state.

The year finished on a high for NSWRL with the Centre of Excellence completed ahead of time and on budget. From 2019, the NSWRL will be housed in the state-of-the-art facility for the next 40 years in a move that will drive even further success for the state. Our players, from our seniors to our women's and our juniors, will be able to train on a full-length playing field that will have direct access to a gymnasium, recovery facilities and medical treatment rooms.

It is an exciting time to be involved in Rugby League in NSW and I look forward to next season.



CEO'S REPORT

David Trodden

BLUE GLORY

The 2018 year was a period of resounding success for the NSWRL.

The financial statements contained within this report reflect an organisation that is continuing to grow on a yearly basis and is on a tremendously sound financial footing. We are in a very strong position to reinvest our resources back into the game of Rugby League in NSW which will continue to set up the organisation and the state for further success in the future.

This year saw the introduction of Brad Fittler as the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach and the State of Origin Shield return to NSW for the first time since 2014. Brad Fittler is a NSWRL Hall of Famer and a True Blue who brought a fresh approach to the series. He surrounded himself with several other True Blues, including Danny Buderus and Greg Alexander, who had an influential impact on the team.

Fittler also returned the team to Sydney after a period spent promoting the game in other areas, and came up with several innovations including a radical jersey design which the team readily embraced. It was hugely satisfying to see the series wrapped up after only two games when you saw the hard work that was going on by everyone behind the scenes.

I was just as excited to see the Harvey Norman NSW Women's team claim the inaugural State of Origin title. It continues a period of dominance for our elite team who have now won the past three consecutive interstate matches. The game was broadcast live on Channel Nine and supported by a vocal crowd at North Sydney Oval in a positive sign for the continued growth and development of the women's game in NSW.

Our pathways teams enjoyed another successful season in a positive sign for the future of the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues. While the under 20s had their run of six successive wins finally broken, both the under 18s and under 16s claimed their third consecutive wins against Queensland to continue our recent dominance in the Origin arena.

Rugby League participation also continues to go from strength to strength in NSW with more than 100,000 people now playing the game. That figure includes a significant increase in female participation which is also pleasing. The Harvey Norman NSW Women's Premiership and the Harvey Norman Tarsha Gale Cup are continuing to grow, and the NSWRL will keep working tirelessly to ensure the women's pathways replicate the men's pathways.

The Intrust Super Premiership NSW enjoyed another successful season, with Channel Nine coming on board to broadcast the game on free-to-air television for the

first time. Combined with pay-TV network FOX Sports, the competition attracted more than 2 million viewers including 85,000 alone for the grand final between Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs and Newtown Jets. Congratulations to the Bulldogs on their premiership win, and for going on to an even bigger stage on NRL Grand Final Day to take out the NRL Intrust Super State Championship.

The Jersey Flegg Cup made a successful return to the NSWRL landscape after a 10-year absence. The competition offers a valuable pathway to under-20s players after the NRL discontinued its National Youth Competition and I congratulate the Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks on their win. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all of our winners for this season including Mounties (Harvey Norman's NSW Women's Premiership), Wentworthville Magpies (Ron Massey Cup), East Campbelltown Eagles (Sydney Shield), Penrith Panthers (UNE SG Ball Cup and under 18s National Championship), Manly Warringah Sea Eagles (UNE Harold Matthews Cup), and Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks (Harvey Norman Tarsha Gale Cup).

It was also a big season for our officials, with five NSW-based referees making their debuts in the National Rugby League competition. Our officials often work a thankless job and I congratulate Adam Cassidy, Todd Smith, Drew Oultram, Liam Nicholls and Mark Bohan for their achievement. It is well-deserved recognition for all the hard work they have put into their game over the years.

I'm pleased to report the season finished on a high for the NSWRL after it was recognised at the NSW Sports Awards as the Organisation of the Year. The prestigious honour reflects the hard work that is put in every day from our dedicated team to promote and grow Rugby League across the state.

I would like to thank our partners, who are individually acknowledged elsewhere in this report, for their valued support and contribution to the NSWRL. These include Brydens Lawyers, nib, The Star, Lion, Canterbury, KARI Foundation, University of New England, McDonalds, Transport for NSW, Intrust Super, Harvey Norman, Compass Corp, Cabe Investments, Steeden, Sydney Olympic Park Authority, Game Day Mouthguards, My Sports Tape, Murrays Coaches, Sydney Markets, Arthur J. Gallagher, Accor and Leagues Club Australia. Our partners have always been a great source of support for our organisation and we are proud to have them as part of the NSW family.

Finally, I would like to thank NSWRL Chairman Dr George Peponis OAM and his board for their ongoing support, as well as the many talented and dedicated staff I work with at the NSWRL. I am confident that our team will help drive even further success in 2019.

CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

The NSWRL unveiled plans four years ago for a multi-million dollar, state-of-the-art Centre of Excellence that would act as a home for the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues and all other representative teams, and take an existing culture of best practice to another level.

The Centre of Excellence was completed on budget and ahead of schedule in December 2018 and will be the new home of the NSWRL for the next 40 years, and will also house Country Rugby League, Men of League Foundation, Kari Foundation and the University of New England.

The Centre of Excellence includes a full-sized playing and training field adjacent to the building with direct access to a gymnasium, a tunnel linking the Centre of Excellence to ANZ Stadium to be used exclusively by the players on game night, change rooms which allows Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach Brad Fittler to make eye contact with every player, recovery facilities and medical treatment rooms, a hydrotherapy room, and a Blues-themed café and museum.

In addition, the Centre of Excellence also includes function and hospitality space for dining and entertainment that will enable guests to watch the team train on the adjacent field, and a 60-person lecture theatre for presentations, media conferences and post-game team analysis.

The Centre of Excellence recognises Rugby League icons and champion players who have played a pivotal role in the organisation's history with areas inside the main building named in their honour.





CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

The NSWRL would like to thank the NSW State Government, the Sydney Olympic Park Authority and the Australian Rugby League Commission for their support in the delivery of the state-of-the-art sports infrastructure for Rugby League in New South Wales.

Centre of Excellence timeline:

November 2015: Plans are announced for a new multi-million dollar, state-of-the-art Centre of Excellence (COE) for the NSWRL to act as a training base for the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues and all other representative teams.

August 2016: NSW Minister for Sport, The Hon. Stuart Ayres, is joined by NSWRL Chairman Dr George Peponis OAM, NSWRL Chief Executive David Trodden and coach Laurie Daley to turn the first sod as major work begins on the Centre of Excellence.

November 2016: Designs are officially released for the NSWRL Centre of Excellence.

October 2017: NSW Minister for Sport, The Hon. Stuart Ayres, is joined by NSWRL chairman Dr George Peponis OAM, NSWRL Chief Executive David Trodden and Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach Brad Fittler to lay the foundation stone as construction work continues at the Centre of Excellence.

May 2018: The Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues train for the first time at the Centre of Excellence in the lead-up to the opening game of the State of Origin series at the MCG on June 6.

COACH'S VIEW

Brad Fittler

I had been working with the NSWRL pathways when the opportunity became available to coach the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues in State of Origin.

Our catchcry for this year was "Whatever It Takes" based on a song that typifies the fighting spirit of the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues. I am confident that fight will continue even more strongly in 2019.



HOLDEN STATE OF ORIGIN REPORT

The 2018 State of Origin series started with a new coach and bold vision for NSW and ended with the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues' first series triumph since 2014.

NSW legend Brad Fittler took over the reins as coach before naming a record 11 debutants for the opening game of the series. The former NSW skipper surrounded himself with other True Blues stars on his staff, including advisor Greg Alexander and assistant coaches Danny Buderus and Andrew Johns, to help facilitate a new era of success in the Origin arena. Fittler introduced his players to a variety of different ideologies to galvanise them, including no mobile phones, not reading or watching the news, yoga, walking barefoot on the grass, and walking to the ground on the night of the game to be among our passionate supporters. The players had no hesitation buying into his philosophies and success quickly followed.

Game One was played at the MCG with the 87,122 fans who crammed into the ground treated to a masterclass performance from fullback James Tedesco on the way to an impressive 22-12 Blues' victory. Game Two saw NSW forced to dig deep after a sin-binning left them with only 12 men for the final 10 minutes of the match. It would be the most telling moment of the series with the NSW defence hanging tough to set up an 18-14 win and clinch their first Shield in four years. The Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues fought doggedly in Game Three and lost no admirers after going down 18-12.

NSW will take enormous confidence from their series win over Queensland, with the new faces in Fittler's team including Nathan Cleary, Damien Cook, Latrell Mitchell and Tom Trbojevic looking to have bright future in the Blues jumper. The outlook is also bright for players who were given a taste of the Origin experience through the extended squad including Australian Kangaroos representatives Jordan McLean and Luke Keary who are expected to feature in future campaigns.

The 2019 season looks even more promising for the Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues after they take up residence in their multi-million dollar, state-of-the-art Centre of Excellence.

WOMEN'S STATE OF ORIGIN REPORT

The Harvey Norman NSW Women's team had the distinction of claiming the inaugural Women's State of Origin over Queensland in front of a vocal crowd at North Sydney Oval.

NSW were forced to dig deep during the match after centre Corban McGregor and hooker Rebecca Riley both left the field in the first half through injury. Fullback Sam Bremner was dominant for NSW after having a hand in all three tries in the 16-10 win, while centre Isabelle Kelly was named Player of the Match after crossing for two tries including the match-winner in the dying minutes.

It was the third consecutive victory for NSW in the interstate contest and the first under the Origin banner.

INTRUST **SUPER PREMIERSHIP NSW**

Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs celebrated their first Intrust Super Premiership NSW title since 2011, when they were crowned the premier team at the end of 2018.

Finishing the regular season in fourth, Canterbury-Bankstown went on to face the Newtown Jets in the competition decider, with more than 8,000 fans converging upon Leichhardt Oval to witness the Bulldogs' 18-12 win.

Canterbury-Bankstown's premiership success capped a ground-breaking year for the ISP NSW competition, which was viewed by a greater audience than ever before

For the first time, ISP NSW matches were broadcast live on free-to-air television every week on Channel Nine's Wide World of Sports. Channel Nine coverage complemented FOX League broadcasts, with the competition reaching an average weekly audience of more than 65,000 viewers.

The Intrust Super Premiership NSW competition continued to be a vital pathway to the National Rugby League, with more than 35 players earning a first-grade debut on the back of their success at the ISP level.

Mounties RLFC and Western Suburbs Magpies were the early pacesetters in the 2018 competition, with each club jostling for a place atop the ISP ladder for much of the first half of the season. The Penrith Panthers emerged as the competition's heavyweight team from Round 12 onwards, right through until their Preliminary Finals clash with the Newtown Jets, putting together an unbeaten run totalling 13 matches.

But the Panthers' hopes of successfully defending their title ended in Week Three at the hands of the Newtown Jets, whose 28-24 win earned them their first Grand Final berth since they won the premiership in 2012. A determined Bulldogs halted the Jets' momentum as they ended their title drought with a breakthrough six-point win.

The Bulldogs went on to claim the NRL Intrust Super State Championship silverware on NRL Grand Final day, downing the Intrust Super Cup (Queensland Cup) premiers Redcliffe Dolphins 42-18 at ANZ Stadium. The Bulldogs' State Championship success marked a third-straight victory for NSW-based sides in the annual interstate clash.



HARVEY NORMAN NSW WOMEN'S PREMIERSHIP

The Harvey Norman NSW Women's Premiership came down to the wire in the 2018 season with the top two teams playing each other twice in the finals.

The Redfern All Blacks were 2017 Premiers in the NSWRL's top-tier women's competition and re-branded to the South Sydney Rabbitohs for the 2018 season.

The competition consisted of nine teams and was played over 14 weeks. Finishing in second position, Mounties beat the Rabbitohs twice in three weeks to finish the season as champions.

Simaima Taufa confirmed her status as one of the best players for NSW and Australia with her influence going a long way to secure Mounties' premiership victory. She scored a try and set up another to secure a closely fought 12-10 win. The Grand Final was played at ANZ Stadium and streamed on NSWRL.com.au.

Isabelle Kelly was named the Player of the Year after an impressive season for CRL Newcastle. She was also named Player of the Match in the Women's State of Origin and was awarded the inaugural international Women's Golden Boot.

The Harvey Norman Women's NSW Premiership continues to be a breeding ground for representative players, with Kelly, Hannah Southwell, Taufa, Elianna Walton and Holli Wheeler all representing the Jillaroos in 2018.



JERSEY FLEGG CUP

The 2018 NSWRL season welcomed the return of the Jersey Flegg Cup competition, as the NRL-administered National Youth Competition (NYC) ceased to exist.

Twelve clubs fielded teams in the competition, vying for the title last won by Penrith Panthers in 2007.

At the end of the regular season, the defending Premiers Penrith rounded out the year in third position, trailing the Minor Premiership-winning Newcastle Knights and the Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks.

Newcastle's under-20s outfit incurred only three losses in the lead-up to the finals series. Pitted against Mounties in the first of two Qualifying Finals, the Knights suffered a dramatic one-point loss, as Mounties secured a Preliminary Finals berth.

Newcastle won through to the Grand Final-qualifier on the back of an emphatic 27-8 win over the Sydney Roosters in the Semi-Final showdown. Cronulla-Sutherland joined Newcastle, Mounties and Penrith as the four remaining teams heading into the Preliminary Finals, downing the Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs 30-10 in the second Semi-Final, a week after falling to Penrith 18-10 in the second Qualifying Final.

A last-gasp Panthers try cruelled the Knights' premiership hopes, and saw Penrith as the first team to win through to the 2018 Jersey Flegg Cup Grand Final, downing Newcastle 30-26 in the first Preliminary Final fixture

The Panthers' four-point Preliminary Final win was mirrored by the Sharks, who continued their momentum to claim the under-20s honours with a 22-12 victory over Penrith, winning the club's first-ever Jersey Flegg Cup title.



RON MASSEY CUP

The Ron Massey Cup was highly competitive with Wentworthville Magpies asserting their dominance with a second consecutive Premiership, along with the Minor Premiership, while teams such as Mounties and St Marys Saints also enjoyed strong campaigns.

The Magpies cemented their premiership credentials after a 13-game unbeaten run between Rounds 4 and 17, which included 11 consecutive victories.

Mounties finished the regular season in second place after remaining undefeated from Round 15, while Cabramatta and St Marys rounded out the top four.

The Guildford Owls and Windsor Wolves were just one win away from a top-four finish, with the Asquith Magpies and Blacktown Workers Sea Eagles scraping into the top eight.

Finals Week One saw some impressive performances from the Sea Eagles and Wolves, while the Magpies and Cabramatta cemented a Preliminary Finals berth with strong wins.

The Magpies and St Marys advanced through to the Grand Final, with the former holding a mental edge over their opponents after comfortably beating them in the first week of the finals.

The decider was also all one-way traffic from start to finish, with the reigning premiers claiming a commanding 38-4 triumph, inspired by 2018 Player of the Year Beau Henry and Abbas Miski, who claimed Man of the Match honours.



SYDNEY SHIELD

The East Campbelltown Eagles continued their dominance in the Sydney Shield competition after claiming their third premiership since 2014 with a 32-22 victory over the Guildford Owls in the Grand Final.

It proved to be a fitting finish for the Eagles after claiming the Minor Premiership with just two losses in the regular season, while St Marys Saints, Moorebank Rams and Wentworthville Magpies also enjoyed strong campaigns to finish in the top four.

The Guildford Owls ensured the competition would not be a four-horse race, surging into the 2018 decider on the back of three consecutive wins in the finals, including a thrilling two-point win over the Magpies in the Preliminary Final.

But the Eagles proved too strong after they scored four unanswered tries to take a comfortable 20-0 lead at half-time, with winger Craig Moustakas scoring a first-half double.

The Owls finished the game in fine style with four tries in the second-half, however, a Man-of-the-Match performance from Brett Lahey ensured the trophy returned to East Campbelltown.

In another standout individual display, Belrose Eagles forward Damien Lawler capped off an incredible season by being named the Sydney Shield Player of the Year for 2018, despite his side missing the finals.



NEWCASTLE BUSINESS PLAZA CUP

It was another successful season for Newcastle Rugby League as the new affiliation with NSWRL helped the Business Plaza Cup grow from strength to strength in 2018.

Plenty of excitement was built throughout the preseason with the first grade competition classified as a NSWRL major competition, on par with the Ron Massey Cup.

An unprecedented number of National Rugby League players participated throughout the 2018 campaign, which culminated in the South Newcastle Lions claiming their second premiership in three years.

They finished third on the competition ladder at the end of the regular season before facing the Minor Premiers, Lakes United Seagulls, in the Grand Final.

It proved to be an enthralling affair with Lakes United holding onto a 10-8 lead at half-time, before the scores were eventually locked at 18-all with just 10 minutes remaining in the game.

Two rapid-fire tries from the Lions in the dying stages ensured a 30-18 victory, with Harry van Dartel claiming the JJ Wilson Medal for Man of the Match.



UNE SG BALL CUP

The NSWRL under-18s junior representative competition was tightly contested with the Penrith Panthers claiming their second UNE SG Ball Cup in three years.

Penrith, chasing their eighth under-18s title, finished in second position in the regular season but were beaten by the Newcastle Knights in the first week of the finals. As a result, they had to defeat Canberra Raiders and Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks respectively to book their Grand Final appearance at Leichhardt Oval with the Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs.

Panthers' captain Shawn Blore had an incredible season and his Grand Final performance was instrumental in their hard-fought 25-18 premiership victory.

The Panthers backed up the premiership at the under-18s National Junior Final when Zachary Cini scored in the final minute to win 38-32 over their Queensland counterparts, the Souths Logan Magpies. Maurice Trindall was judged Player of the Match.

Newcastle Knights five-eighth Jock Madden was named the UNE SG Ball Player of the Year after he steered his side deep into the finals. They eventually went down to the Bulldogs in the Preliminary Final.

The Sydney Roosters were minor premiers in the SG Ball Cup, while the Knights and Sharks rounded out the top four. The Bulldogs made the Grand Final from fifth position, while Canberra, Manly Warringah Sea Eagles and Illawarra Steelers finished on 10 competition points each to make the top eight.





UNE HAROLD MATTHEWS CUP

Manly Warringah Sea Eagles claimed their first Harold Matthews Cup title with a 26-18 win over Parramatta Eels, avenging the heartbreak of their 2017 Grand Final loss.

Parramatta, the most-decorated club in the history of the competition, went in search of a 21st under-16s title, but their ambitions of replicating their 2016 premiership success were cut short by the all-conquering Manly Warringah outfit.

The Sea Eagles ran in five tries to three in the competition's deciding fixture against the Eels, just three weeks after they met in a Qualifying Final clash at Lottoland (Brookvale Oval). Scoring a 26-24 win that afternoon, the Sea Eagles earned a week's rest and booked an eventual Week Three clash with the Penrith Panthers.

Parramatta battled with Penrith for a Grand Final berth, which they secured on the back of a big 36-12 win at St Marys Leagues Stadium.

Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs, Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks, Balmain Tigers and Illawarra Steelers rounded out the top eight in the 2018 finals series, but it was the top four teams who contested the Grand Final-qualifying clashes.





HARVEY NORMAN TARSHA GALE CUP

The Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks dominated the NSWRL under-18s girls junior representative competition, taking out the Harvey Norman Tarsha Gale Cup Premiership and Minor Premiership.

Played in a nine-a-side format and alongside existing junior representative competitions (SG Ball Cup and Harold Matthews Cup), the Tarsha Gale Cup provided a competitive pathway for emerging female stars. Eleven teams took part and some players progressed to the Harvey Norman NSW Women's Premiership throughout the year.

Cronulla-Sutherland kicked off the year with a 70-18 win over the Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs, which was a fair indication of their season. They averaged 65 points a game in the regular season, with their lowest total being 46.

Faith Nathan scored 11 tries in the Sharks' three finals games - a hat-trick in their 40-38 Qualifying Final win against Newcastle Knights; five tries in the 44-30 Preliminary Final victory against Illawarra Steelers; and another hat-trick in their 36-22 premiership win.

Sharks five-eighth Madison Higgins-Ashby was judged Harvey Norman Tarsha Gale Cup Player of the Year after steering her side to 2018 success.

COUNTRY RUGBY LEAGUE

An increase in senior males, new and returning players and the continual growth of female participation saw Country Rugby League record a 5.5 per cent increase in registered players in 2018; with more than 59,000 registered players representing more than 500 clubs across Regional NSW.

With one-third of all nationally registered players participating in CRL competitions, the increase was evenly spread with four out of six regions recording increases in male participation and all six regions recording growth in female participation – a 28 per cent increase now sees more than 11,000 women competing in CRL competitions and accounting for 48 per cent of all nationally registered female players.

This season also saw the introduction of CRL's new Junior Representative Competitions – the Andrew Johns and Laurie Daley Cups – which featured 11 teams competing in each division and eight franchises linked with NRL clubs.

The introduction of these competitions allows for young players from regional areas to be part of NRL club pathways, while remaining in their hometowns among family and support networks.

Further highlights included NSW Country winning the inaugural Women's National Championship, national recognition for dedicated volunteers with Max and Lorna Dawes (Coffs Harbour) and Jessica Skinner (Trangie) taking out the CRL and National Volunteer of the Year and Women In League Achievement Awards, more than 2000 players given the opportunity to play representative football through CRL Pathway initiatives and a major increase in Women's CRL Nines Competitions taking place across the state.

COMMUNITY FOOTBALL

NSWRL continued to grow the game at grassroots level across the state in 2018 to reaffirm its commitment to community football.

Our seven club and competition officers continued to work to better resource Junior Rugby League clubs to help ease the burden on volunteers. Female participation continued to grow at a phenomenal rate with 46 teams featuring in junior and open-age competitions across the state.

NSWRL's dedication to take the game to fans and families was reflected in the 76,000 people reached during the All Schools Carnival on nswrl.com.au and the NSWRL Facebook page.

NSWRL demonstrated its commitment to inclusion and multiculturalism with the Blue Harmony Cup, an event for Under-18 and Under-16 boys and girls which saw more than 10 heritage groups take part.

NSWRL also ran a 10-week Tackle Safe Rugby League pilot program called "Try League" in Blacktown, which attracted 70 newcomers to the game, including 20 children of Indian descent.

The Community Football Department continued to raise the level of professionalism at grassroots levels across the state:

- Penrith and Parramatta districts achieved
 100 per cent in the areas of coaching
 compliance and accreditation
- More than 3000 people attended faceto-face club information nights for Junior League volunteers and officials
- Plans were launched for a Blues Tag nontackle competition following the success of a trial program involving female players.



COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

NSWRL continues to make a positive impact with its community programs reinforcing the fun and respectful message for the game.

The NSWRL's Respect Campaign, which encourages respect protocols for all teams and competitions in NSW, moved into its third successful season with a more than 60,000 players, officials and spectators exposed to the important program. Several initiatives were also incorporated into NRL matches.

The tireless work of volunteers across the state was celebrated at the NSWRL Awards at the Waterview in Bicentennial Park, Sydney Olympic Park. Norman Towells, of Five Dock RSL Junior Rugby League, claimed the prestigious NSWRL "Gordon Lowrie" Volunteer of the Year Award, for 30 years of service in what was a fitting way to end another successful season of NSWRL community programs.

Hogs For The Homeless and Hogs For The Farmers

NSWRL's Hogs tours proved more important than ever in 2018 after rides were scheduled to assist droughtstricken farmers and the homeless.

Spearheaded by Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach Brad Fittler, the Hogs For The Homeless ride in February covered 3,500 km over 10 days and took the total raised for Youth off the Streets since 2013 to almost \$700,000.

True Blues Danny Buderus, Steve Menzies and Nathan Hindmarsh accompanied Fittler with highlights including balls being handed out to 3000 children across 15 country towns and the re-turfing of an entire Rugby League field in Wellington.

Fittler embarked on another tour dubbed Hogs For The Farmers in September to help raise the spirits of drought-stricken farmers and their families. The NSWRL and their partners also donated \$66,000 for the ride that started on Sydney's northern beaches and included visits to Tamworth and Coonamble.





Indigenous Programs

The NSWRL continued its commitment to the Indigenous Community with almost 700 boys and girls taking part in the sixth annual PCYC Nations of Origin Sevens tournament at the Lakeside Sporting Complex in Raymond Terrace.

A total of 59 boys and girls teams representing 25 NSW Aboriginal Nations travelled from across the state to take part in the two-day tournament which is the largest Aboriginal youth sporting event in NSW.

The NSWRL Talented Aboriginal Athlete Program (TAAP) celebrated its 16th year of operation with an overseas trip for the first time. Designed to help guide the next generation of Indigenous talent in NSW, an under-16s side travelled to Tonga and was accompanied by former Rugby League stars Nathan Blacklock and Ron Gibbs.

TAAP also ran a two-day camp at Narrabeen for more than 50 under-16 Aboriginal boys from across the state to receive expert coaching and development.

Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues coach Brad Fittler attended the camp alongside Blacklock and Gibbs to provide expert advice. A trial game was held to select the under-16 Koori team to face Queensland's under-16 Murri team in Mudgee in 2019 as a curtainraiser to the Charity Shield between South Sydney Rabbitohs and St George Illawarra Dragons.





MEDIA COVERAGE

The Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues and the NSWRL continued to make inroads into the media landscape with emerging markets and growth in existing areas helping to deliver the product to fans.

The Brydens Lawyers NSW Blues' win in the opening State of Origin game drew close to 4 million viewers at its peak and represented a 15 per cent increase in TV viewership compared to the corresponding game last year.

The second game was played on a Sunday night instead of Wednesday night for the first time since 2001 and proved to be a ratings winner after dominating its time slot.

The commitment and investment in our digital team continued to pay dividends, with the nswrl.com.au website drawing more than 5 million page views for the second consecutive season as part of the newly-created NRL digital network.

The State of Origin period was particularly strong in driving traffic, backed by coach Brad Fittler's decision to have a more open media policy to help engage with fans. The website attracted more than 1.5 million unique visitors throughout the Origin period.

The importance of social media in being able to relay information to fans also proved to be an area of growth for the NSWRL with the combined channels of Facebook, Instagram and Twitter reaching a combined audience of almost 1.1 million – an approximate aggregate growth of 10 per cent.

The Intrust Super Premiership NSW also enjoyed unprecedented television coverage with free-to-air broadcaster Channel Nine committing to showing one game a week. Combined with FOX Sports, the competition attracted more than 2 million viewers for the season with 85,000 tuning in to see Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs topple Newtown Jets in the Grand Final.

The 2018 NSWRL True Blues evening honoured the contribution of late greats Keith Holman, Ken Irvine and Steve Rogers after they were inducted into the NSWRL The Star Hall of Fame.

The three inductees were unveiled at the NSWRL's annual True Blues dinner in front of more than 500 Rugby League and other dignitaries, including the NSW Minister for Sport, the Hon Stuart Ayres.

Rugby League would struggle to continue without volunteers and their invaluable contribution to the game was recognised at the annual NSWRL Volunteer of the Year Awards in front of almost 300 guests at the Waterview in Bicentennial Park, Sydney Olympic Park.

This surplus is inclusive of \$9,913,947 (2017: \$821,877) of grant income recognised in respect of the Centre of Excellence being constructed in Sydney Olympic Park, interest income of \$228,853 (2017: \$292,698) earnt from Centre of Excellence funding amounts still held by the Company and to be used for the construction of the Centre of Excellence, and a \$954,638 (2017: \$857,728) net contribution deriving from the Blatchys Blues supporter group acquired in a previous year.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE STATE OF AFFAIRS

Commencing 2018, the Company is in receipt of additional funding from the National Rugby League to facilitate a rugby league Pathways funding program to member clubs. During the period an amount of \$4,200,000 has been received and expensed, recognising the granting of funds to clubs in line with agreed outcomes. This is reflected in the following lines:

- Revenue: NRL Funding Elite Pathways
- Expense: Referee and game expense

In addition to the above, the Company has received grant funding of \$750,000 from the Australian Rugby League Commission for the purpose of employment of 7 new positions - Community Competition Co-Ordinators, to provide direct assistance to junior rugby league. This is reflected in the following lines:

- Revenue: ARLC Funding NSWRL
- Expense: Employee expenses Salaries and wage

Apart from the above matters, there were no other significant changes in the state of affairs of the Company in the financial year.

EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO REPORTING DATE

There has not arisen in the interval between the end of the financial period and the date of this report any transaction or event of a material nature, likely in the opinion of the Directors, to affect significantly the operations of the Company, the results or state of affairs of the Company.

ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATION

The Company's operations are not subject to any significant environmental regulations under either Commonwealth or State legislation.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS

In August 2018, a memorandum of understanding was signed with the Country Rugby League of NSW Ltd in relation to hold formal discussions to merge into a single entity by 1 November 2020. The Directors do not anticipate any other developments in the operation of the Company which would significantly affect the operating result in subsequent years relating to current performance.

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE OF OFFICERS

The Company has provided for and paid premiums during the year for directors' and officers' liability and legal expenses insurance contracts.

The insurance premiums relate to:

- Costs and expenses incurred by the relevant officers in defending proceedings, whether civil or criminal and whatever their outcome.
- Other liabilities that may arise from their position, with the exception of conduct involving a wilful breach of duty
 or improper use of information or position to gain a personal advantage.

The directors have not included details of the nature of the liabilities covered and the amount of the premium paid in respect of the directors' and officers' liability and legal expenses insurance contracts, as such disclosure is prohibited under the terms of the contract.


